

Sabuk



Highlights

- Experience the Kenyan wilderness on foot or by vehicle
- Awe-inspiring views of the surrounding Laikipia area.
- A range of intriguing activities including river swimming, camel led walking safaris, river line fishing or cultural visits.
- Game viewing that includes a number of rarer species by night as well as day.

Situation

Laikipia, Kenya's Rift Valley. Nearest airstrip is Loisaba (1 hour scenic drive from the lodge).

Activities

Day and night game drives; guided bush walks; camel assisted walking safaris; river line fishing; fly camping; bush breakfasts & lunches; swimming pool; sundowners.

Sabuk (meaning buffalo) is a remote luxury lodge in Laikipia overlooking the Ewaso Nyiro River at a picturesque gorge. Sabuk lodge is set in 1500 acres which is home to a variety of wildlife including dik-dik, giraffe, zebra, leopard, elephants, antelope and wild dog.

You can go for game drives (day or night), however the main reason for coming to Sabuk is to enjoy the wilderness either on foot or with horses or camels. You can also go fishing, swim in the river and visit a Laikipiak Maasai village in the nearby community group ranch. If you are here for a few days, you may want to stay out fly-camping for a night or two. One of the excellent Samburu guides will ensure that you see the best of what this region has to offer.

There are currently eight large en-suite, open-sided rooms (doubles or twins), two of which are suitable for families, plus 'Eagle Cottage' which consists of 2 bedrooms with a sitting room and pool. All the rooms are built of stone, wood and thatch very much in keeping with the landscape, but also very comfortable, and with fabulous views even from the baths of most rooms!

There is a cosy main living area with lounge and dining room looking out on to the same awe-inspiring landscape. The food is excellent. There is a swimming pool and you can also swim in the river.

Fly camping is available where you can go out on camel led walking safaris overnight (or for several

nights) camping along the way in the wilderness.

Fair Trade / Responsible Tourism

Sabuk gives a per person per night fee to the community adjoining Sabuk land. The small shop sells crafts bought from local women.
